Instruction for Authors (Manuscript submission)

1. **Terms of Submission:** Submission of a manuscript implies: that the work described has not been published before; that it is not under consideration for publication anywhere else and that its publication has been approved by all coauthors.
2. **Submission:** Nigerian Journal of Life Sciences (NJLS) uses the OJS Journal Editorial Management System by PKP for online manuscript submission, review and tracking. Click Here (<https://unibenlsj.org.ng/index.php/njls/about/submissions>). For technical challenges, kindly send a mail to: editorial@unibenlsj.org.ng. Upon successful initial review and compliance with all required journal instructions, including plagiarism which should be less than 15%, the manuscripts will be subjected to double blind peer review process with at least two reviewers involved.
3. **Submission Fees:** All submissions should go along with a Handling Fee of N5,000 or \$20 payable to the Journal Account Details with link below (https://unibenlsj.org.ng/index.php/njls/njls_apc)
4. **Publishing Fess:** Upon acceptance of a manuscript for publication, the author(s) shall pay the sum of N30,000 (authors resident in Nigeria) or \$100.00 (for authors outside Nigeria), payable to the Nigerian Journal of Life Sciences UNIBEN, Account Number: 1219286207, Zenith Bank Nigeria.
5. **Publication:** An article shall be published first online, thereafter, it shall appear in the next print issue of the journal. The corresponding author is entitled to a PDF of the article and a print copy of the issue containing the publication. Additional copies of the print version can be ordered from the Journal Office at extra cost.
6. **Manuscripts:** Manuscripts should be type written in English (UK) with double spacing throughout (including references tables, legends and footnotes) as a standard document (doc or docx) with plain font (e.g., Times Roman), size 12 and left justified. All pages must be numbered. Authors are requested to ensure that line and page numbering are included in the main text file of their manuscript to facilitate peer review
7. **The manuscript should be divided into the following heading:**
The title page: should include the title of the article, the full names and correspondence addresses of all authors, clearly indicating the author to whom correspondence should be addressed. The e-mail address of the corresponding author should also be provided.

Abstract: This should be 250 words or less including a brief statement on the objective of the study, the methodology, the key findings and implications of the work.

Key Words: Provide a maximum of 5 key subjects covered in the paper including the names of the major organisms studied and any important chemical compounds.

The text of a full paper should consist of an Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgements and References.

Tables and Figures: Tables and Figures should not be inserted within the text. They should be listed consecutively after the references in the order in which they were mentioned in the text. All tables should be numbered using Arabic numerals. Supply a caption (title) for each table, explaining the components of the table. Identify any previously published material by giving the original source in the form of a reference at the end of the table caption. Figures (graphs, line drawings, line art, maps, photomicrographs, etc) should be identified as “Figs” followed by the appropriate title (e.g., Fig. 1. Title).

References: In the text the Harvard referencing format (author, date) must be followed. All cited references in the text must appear on the list of references at the end of the paper. List references in alphabetical order, with journal name fully written and italicized.
